

As the year unfolds, I carry the lessons of this month—the calm of the Kumbh Mela and the hope in humanity's resilience—as my guiding light toward a more peaceful world.

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



Recruit Rotary Peace Fellow candidates

Rotary and Rotaract clubs can work with their district Rotary Foundation chair or Rotary Peace Fellowship subcommittee chair to recruit and recommend candidates for Rotary Peace Fellowships. Each year, the Foundation awards up to 130 fellowships to experienced peacebuilders from around the world so they can study at one of our Rotary Peace Centers. The fellows can earn a master's degree or an advanced professional development certificate in disciplines related to peace and development.

Applications will be accepted from 1 February through 15 May. Peace fellows will begin their studies in 2026 at partner universities in Australia, Japan, Sweden, Türkiye, Uganda, the United Kingdom, and the United States. Find out who is eligible and how they can apply. The Foundation pays for tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and internship and field-study expenses. Clubs and districts do not need to provide funding in order to recommend fellowship candidates. Use this referral form to have information sent to potential candidates.

Since the Rotary Peace Centers program began in 2002, more than 1,800 fellows have graduated from our programs. They are working in peace and development in more than 140 countries.

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World Neglected Tropical Diseases Day is observed every year on 30 January

On World Neglected Tropical Diseases Day 2025, the World Health Organization (WHO) is calling on everybody, including leaders and communities, to unite, act and eliminate neglected tropical diseases (NTDs) by making bold, sustainable investments to free the estimated 1.5 billion people, in the world's most vulnerable communities, from a vicious cycle of disease and poverty.

The purpose of World Neglected Tropical Diseases Day is to raise the profile of NTDs, highlight the suffering they cause and garner support for their control, elimination or eradication, in line with the programmatic targets set out in WHO's road map 2021–2030 and the commitments of the 2022 Kigali declaration on neglected tropical diseases.

On 31 May 2021, the Seventy-fourth World Health Assembly recognized 30 January as World Neglected Tropical Diseases Day through the unanimous approval of decision WHA74(18) by WHO Member States. This Day is now one of 11 Global Health Days and 2 Global Health Weeks recognized by WHO.

Neglected tropical diseases at a glance

- Neglected tropical diseases (NTDs) are a diverse group of 21+ conditions that are widespread in the world's poorest regions, where water safety, sanitation, and access to health care are inadequate or suboptimal.
- Caused by a variety of pathogens including viruses, bacteria, protozoa, parasitic worms, fungi and toxins, NTDs affect over 1 billion people globally and are responsible for thousands of preventable deaths every year. As of end 2023, the population requiring interventions for at least one NTD is estimated at 1.5 billion.
- These diseases are called "neglected" because they have historically ranked very low on the global health agenda, if they have appeared at all, receiving little attention and funding.
- NTDs cost developing communities the equivalent of billions of dollars every year in direct health costs, loss of productivity and reduced socioeconomic and educational attainment.
- They are also responsible for other consequences such as chronic morbidity, disability, stigmatization, social exclusion, discrimination and bias, and place considerable financial strains on patients and their families.

Brief summary World NTD Day 2025

- NTDs can be prevented, controlled and eliminated. As of December 2024, 54 countries have succeeded in eliminating at least one NTD, more than halfway towards reaching WHO's goal of 100 countries having eliminated at least one NTD by 2030. Several countries have eliminated 2, 3 or 4 NTDs. Globally, 75 elimination processes have been successfully completed and acknowledged by WHO. In 2024, 7 countries eliminated an NTD.
- In 2023 alone, over 860 million people received treatment for NTDs through mass drug administration
 or individual disease management. However, gaps remain, and while drug treatments are available for
 many NTDs, often they do not reach those who need them most.
- Interventions against NTDs are supported by one of the largest medicine donation programmes globally: currently, 20 different types of medicines are donated by 12 manufacturers to support NTD interventions. Between 2011 and 2024, almost 30 billion tablets and vials have been delivered to countries; 1.8 billion were donated and delivered for treatments carried out in 2024 alone.
- NTD programmes were deprioritized in many countries during COVID-19, resulting in massive disruptions to treatment and care. Adaptation and innovation are helping countries to resume these programmes, complemented by integrated and collaborative interventions.
- In 2020, WHO published the NTD road map for 2021–2030, setting out a comprehensive blueprint to
 ensure that NTDs are controlled, eliminated or eradicated by 2030. However, as a result of reduced
 investment and other challenges, those targets, which align with the UN Sustainable Development
 Goals, risk not being achieved.
- WHO is addressing the above challenges through a series of initiatives that have already been initiated and will further grow in 2025. These include estimating the cost of interventions required to achieve the 2030 targets, for both planning and resource mobilization purposes; expanding the arsenal of online tools for capacity development; strengthening monitoring & evaluation of NTD interventions, data systems and supply chains of NTD medicines and other health products; identifying the main programmatic gaps through the development of a Research & Development blueprint for NTDs, and advocating for targeted action to fill such gaps; finally, investigating the impact of climate change and adapting disease control intervention accordingly.
- On World NTD Day 2025, WHO is calling on everyone, including leaders and communities, to Unite, to Act, and to Eliminate neglected tropical diseases.

With Million pilgrims and tourists have congregated at the ongoing Maha Kumbh Mela in Prayagra for different reasons to seek salvation, to pray for worldly comforts, to sustain livelihoods, or to simply soak in the moment.





Prayagraj

This January, millions of saffron-clad people stand on the confluence of the rivers Ganga and Yamuna and the mythical river Saraswati in Prayagraj, Uttar Pradesh. They wait patiently to immerse themselves in the icy waters. The pilgrims believe that taking a dip at the Sangam during the 45-day-long Maha Kumbh Mela (great festival of the sacred pitcher) will cleanse their souls of all negativity and help them attain moksha (freedom from the eternal cycle of life, death, and rebirth).

The swarm of saints, sadhus, ash-smeared Nagas (a sect of Hindu ascetics), pilgrims, and tourists is so large that not even an inch of the ground is visible at the river bank. People enter and move out of the ghats from all directions, but in an orderly fashion.

Pilgrims take turns to bathe. Many of them also help strangers, some of who look dazed in this sea of humans.

In the Hindu mythology. "During the Samudra Manthan (churning of the ocean), the devas (gods) and asuras (demons) were seeking amrit (the elixir of immortality). As they churned the ocean for amrit, a battle broke out between them.

would trick them, the devas entrusted Lord Vishnu with the kumbh (urn) containing the amrit.

As Lord Vishnu travelled with it, drops of amrit spilled from his kumbh at Prayagraj, Haridwar, Ujjain, and Nasik."






While the Ardh Kumbh Mela is held every three years by rotation in these four cities, the Kumbh Mela is held once in 12 years.

This year it is the Maha Kumbh, which is celebrated every 144 years.

The world of statistics look with awe at the statistics;400 million people over 44 days, over 15 million taking the dip on the first day, a temporary city across 4,000 hectares, 150,000 tents, 3,000 kitchens,145,000 restrooms, with 40,000 security personnel, 2,700 Al-enabled cameras, etc*. With expected 45 crore (400 Million) people would have visited the Mela, making this among the largest religious events of the world.








After taking a dip at the ghat, people get ready to visit the ashrams of 13 akharas, the ancient sects of warwot sits. You will find unique ascetics who come here to attend the Mela before vanishing into the deep forests or the Himalayas. The Kumbh pilgrimage is not complete until you bathe, provide charity, and take the blessings of ascetics.






She is especially eager to meet Digambar Diwakar Bharti, a baba (saint) who has reportedly...kept one hand lifted in the air for about 10 years. Some ashrams are gigantic; they belong to sadhus who are millionaires. There are also tiny huts that belong to Nagas, a sect of ascetics who believe in renouncing all material possessions, in many caked in ash, sit around fires.

The babas are of all kinds. 'Rudraksha baba" wears a crown weighing 40 kilogrammes. It 1s made of rudraksha beads (dried seeds from the Elaeocarpus ganitrus tree), which symbolise the tears of Lord Shiva.



Another prints and aviator shades during the day and night.

Yet another wears gold jewellery weighing 5-6 kg and costing 22.5 crore-3 crore.

Abhay Singh, popularly known as 'IT baba' as he had studied at the premier educational institution, is bas lecture pilgrims on Sanatana Dharma, Hindu traditions, values, and the importance of charity.

There are also astrologers and palm readers everywhere. People who are desperate to find a partner, or get a job, or build a house, or have children, flock to them.

Everyone is curious about their future. Cultures and ways or worship may be different, but our emotions are universal.

Kumbh is divided into 25 sectors. One of them is Arail. The townships of Teliyargunj and Jhunsi lie parallel to Arail. Pilgrims from poor economic backgrounds and Kalpwasis stay here. Kalpwasis are devotees who live a minimalistic life. They stay at the Kumbh Mela for weeks, eating only once a day, bathing before sunrise, and spending their time in prayer and meditation.

Sanjay Kumar, 46, from Bhadohi, says the Kumbh has become expensive for Kalpwasis.

Everyone loves these hierarchies. But at the Kumbh, you won't find any Dalit, Thakur, or Brahmin; everyone is a devotee here.

The Uttar Pradesh government's digital gallery that showcases the journey of the Maha Kumbh Mela through virtual reality installations and other digital technologies does not mention the akhara for transgender people even though this is among the most crowded akharas at the Mela.

People line up to click photos with sadhus of the transgender community who, unlike other sadhus, wear silk sarees, heavy jewellery, and makeup. they discuss in exchange for nice grains and cash.




This place is fascinating, the joy and display of faith are amazing. People are really friendly. I am overwhelmed by the sounds of chants, prayers and smells..

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
